

General Supply List for Zoom Workshops with Debby Kratovil
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***This list is for students signed up to take a class with Debby Kratovil. It is NOT to be shared with other teachers. Thank you!

Having your tools and sewing machine ready ahead of time will enable you to maximize the time we spend together. Here is a list of things that are a must for a sewing machine class:

- Sewing machine in good working order; set up to get an accurate ¼" seam. That may mean a ¼" foot or just moving the needle over. I do NOT like sewing with a ¼" foot. I prefer to move my SM needle over and use the edge of my general sewing foot. If in doubt, use a 3 x 5 note card (printed in the USA and NOT internationally – because they use the metric system) to check your seams. Distance between lines is ¼"!
- Thread (neutral) and a few filled bobbins
- Fabric pre-cut (if that is stated in the **Supply List**). You don't have to cut it all, but just enough to get started. Each supply list is unique. Any questions, feel free to email!
- Rotary cutting tools and mat
 - Cutter with new or good blade
 - Acrylic ruler (6" x 12" or 6-1/2" x 12-1/2") and possibly a square ruler (8-1/2" x 8-1/2" or 12-1/2" x 12-1/2")
 - Cutting mat (whatever size works for you)
 - Scissors or snips
 - Pins without big heads (or whatever works best for you); pincushion
 - Specialty ruler or template needed for specific project (if applicable)
- Ironing station or place you can easily get to for pressing your work
- Design surface. This can be as simple as using a batting covered piece of foam core. You will want to lay your blocks out to see your assembly. If your sewing room is carpeted and you typically use the floor for this, then that's ok!
- Your class pattern printed and easy to access while you take the class.
- Pencil or pen for taking notes. Some classes require drawing lines on the wrong side of a square for making triangles; a sharp mechanical pencil is best for this.

A few notes about copyright:

- My classes are not to be recorded.
- My patterns are not to be shared in any way. You pay for the class, the pattern is yours. When you share it and think you're being generous, you are just asking me to be generous. If you want to be generous, buy your friend her own copy of the pattern. This is how I make a living to pay my bills.
