CSQG MEETING MINUTES – MARCH 9, 2023

Fran Scher called the meeting to order at 6:44pm with 41 members present and 4 guests - Kara Jones, Marilyn Whalen (President of Four County Quilt Guild), Debbie Holt, and Maryjean Spencer.

Sandy Dunning introduced David Sirota, the guest speaker, via Zoom. The title of his talk is "What makes quilters tick?" David was a former vet tech turned quilter, who began sewing because he needed some kitchen curtains. Since then, he developed his own "no more tears" method for foundation paper piecing, which he will teach at the Saturday workshop.

Brenda Barnhardt set up a sewing station to allow members to examine the three Janome machines donated by Mary Beth Glover. All had a Buy-It-Now price. At the end of the evening, the two smaller machines were bought by members. The larger machine will now be placed on silent auction.

A reminder from Sandy that Sip-n-Sew at Sew n' Place meets on the second Monday of every month.

Our April meeting will feature RaNae Merrill. Helen Wasserman has been given permission by RaNae to teach mandala quilts at Sew n' Place, provided that attendees purchase her book. Sign up for the class through the Sew n' Place website. Class is limited to 6 participants.

Marty Simmons announced that candidates for the guild's President and Secretary will be revealed during the April meeting. In the meantime, if anyone else would like to serve in these positions, contact Marty.

For Community Service, the guild is currently sewing pillowcases for children who have recently experienced loss. Pillowcases should be submitted to Kate Lane by the April meeting.

Marty announced that the guild has partnered with the James S. Stockman Cancer Institute for Community Service. Quilts will be used for cancer therapy and infusion chairs. The institute is requesting 34-42" x 66-68" quilts. We have several long arm quilters who can quilt finished tops.

For those who would like a simpler project to make, fabric tote bags to carry each quilt are also being requested by the Institute.

Another recipient of an ongoing Community Service project is the Animal Welfare League of Frederick County. For this, the guild intends to make use orphan fabrics from our Last Chance Stash.

Brenda Barnhardt unveiled our 2023 Guild Challenge, "Buttons and Embellishments." Handouts were provided and information will be included in the newsletter.

The winners of the 2 quilt boxes granted for membership renewals were Julie Howell and Robin Rippeon.

A field trip is being planned to visit Jinny Beyer's exhibit at the Virginia Heritage Museum. Contact Mary Pauley for details.

Meeting adjourned at 8:39pm.

CSQG BOARD MEETING MINUTES - MARCH 2, 2023

Fran Scher opened the board meeting at 7:04 pm. Board members present include Fran, Sandy Dunning, Darlene Morris, Jessica Halpin, Brenda Barnhardt, Marty Simmons, Joan Watkins, Jennifer Chua, Robin Rippeon, and Becky Lyons.

As of 03/02/2023, 41 members and 2 new members have paid their dues according to Darlene and Sandy. Sandy spearheaded the quilt box drawings for members who renew early.

Darlene is the new chair for Block of the Month. Congratulations, Darlene!

Robin provided the financial statement through February. Total income is \$3,128.07, mostly from renewal of dues. Total expense is \$546.68 with a net income of \$2,581.39. The guild has a healthy bank balance of \$14,645.30.

Robin recently changed her computer, requiring the purchase of the latest version of QuickBook (\$549) compatible with her new operating system. She uses the software for our guild and her church. Fran suggested that our guild pay for half of the cost (\$274). Robin made a motion and was approved by all. Renewal date for the software is February 16, 2024 and will need to be purchased again next year.

Marty plans to announce candidates for the Secretary and President positions during the April meeting, giving more members time to think about running for office. Voting will be in May.

Marty, as the temporary chair of the Community Service Committee, announced that the Stockman Cancer Institute will be the recipients of our quilts for 2023. We are committed for a minimum of 30 quilts and the project will begin in May. In the meantime, the guild will be making pillowcases for the children's charities chosen by Kate Lane. Jessica plans to create a Google document on the website to track the quilts in progress and any longarm needs. The guild will also begin tracking our Community Service quilts with pictures for our historical records.

Brenda has inventoried Mary Beth Glover's sizable donation. Three sewing machines will have buy-it-now prices in the March meeting. Unsold machine(s) will be auctioned off in blind bids sent to Jessica. Payment for the machine will be considered donation to the guild. Jessica will draft email.

According to Jessica, fundraising for the guild is going well. The guild will have a table (\$10/day) at the flea market organized by Frederick Handmade. She plans to sell leftover items from the Last Chance Stash table there. Fundraising through Red Bubble is also generating income. Individual quilts from the quilt show are now being uploaded into the site. Guild pins have been ordered and pricing will be determined. These should be available to sell during the April meeting. The English Paper Piecing class at the Delaplaine is in April.

Sandy briefly discussed our programs for the next three months. To accompany RaNae Merrill's April talk, Helen Wasserman will be offering a mandala quilt workshop at Sew n Place. Post her Presidency, Fran will co-chair the Programs Committee with Sandy Dunning.

Becky Lyons announced that our Community Service for 2022 was featured in Frederick Health magazine. She would like more photos of the guild in action to be submitted to the Frederick Post. The pictures should show something happening, instead of people just standing around.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:40pm.

May Program Preview:







It's a play of the shapes and contrast between light and dark fabrics that makes it all happen.


COMMUNITY SERVICE

Our committee revealed two projects for the year during the March guild meeting. The first project is to make and deliver 30 quilts with quilt tote bags to the James M. Stockman Cancer Institute, located in Frederick. The quilts are to be made for adult

patients and should measure between 34" to 42" wide, and 66" to 68" long. We'll have sign-up tracking sheets for those who are planning to make quilts available at the April meeting with a "thank-you" bonus for members who sign up during the meeting!








We've heard that some guild members have already started working on the quilts we'll be delivering to the James M. Stockman Cancer Center. Check out the really great quilt top and bag that Danita Frisby made above! How wonderful! The quilts will be given to the patients when they are in the center's treatment chairs.

The second project is to make and deliver Cat Hammocks and Cat Pads to the Animal Welfare League of Frederick County located in Frederick. A great thing about this project is that the Community Service Committee will be able to collect fabric from the Last Chance Stash that hasn't been sold to members by the end of the meeting and make it available to members to use to complete the hammocks and pads (you will need to supply batting).

If you are trying to shop for fabric for your quilts, please don't forget the bargains at the Last Chance Stash. There are no particular requirements from the cancer center for the quilt patterns, fabric colors or fabric patterns that you use.

We will supply you with the CSQG labels which you will need to sew onto the back of your quilts. We will begin collecting the finished quilts in the August guild meeting. More information about the guilts, guilt bags, and cat hammocks will be available under the Community Service area of the Members Only section of our website within the next couple of weeks. Handouts for all the projects, quilt labels and sign-up sheets will be available at the Community Service Table during the April and May meetings. Samples of easy to make quilts, the quilt bag and cat hammocks will be shown at the table during the April meeting.

The Stitches Through Time exhibition features ten quilts from the collection of Heritage Frederick.

Nineteenth century examples include an album quilt made in Woodsboro in 1848 as a wedding gift for Mary Ann Hyder Bowman;

Two quilts made in the 1870s by Georgianna Clem Rice of Creagerstown; A Triple-Irish Chain quilt made in 1858 by Ann Gore Kinzer of Johnsville and sent as a gift to upstate New York for her children's teacher who had fled the area due to political tensions prior to the Civil War; an 1884 Crazy Quilt and a Signature quilt from 1850 covered in the names of early Frederick City families.

The two 20th century quilts are examples of gift, fundraiser or "going-away" signature quilts on view in the hallway of the exhibit where you can peruse the 714 names stitches on a quilt made by the parishioners of Calvary United Methodist Church, Frederick in 1931 or the 170 names on a 1923 quilt from the Burkittsville Reformed Church of the Resurrection.



She used her embroidery machine to customize it and a technique to create straps that used the inside and outside fabrics. Sharon also brought one of two sweet baby quilts for her upcoming babies joining the family. Her last piece was this amazing zebra from the scrappy applique workshop offered via Nimble Fingers.







Libi Driggers' awesome and intricate Frederick quilt is celebrating its 10th anniversary. The quilt was from a class done over a year's time through Cindy Powell at Needles and Pins. Fran Scher's stunning modern wall hanging, Shadow Boxes, was created using triangle graph paper in Electric Quilt 8 and inspired by a quilt seen at Mancuso. She also learned how to program her new automated quilting on her longarm to do



straight line quilting. Finally, she faced the quilt with some guidance from Olga! Danita Frisby shared two absolutely adorable table runners she made for sale for fundraising.
